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

ASK Hive Community Hub

Our application to acquire the school is progressing, and we are hoping for a positive decision in the next couple of weeks in June.

The task force have been driving this application for over a year now, and if successful we will need lots of help to get underway properly.



The tightest schedule is the Governments Community Ownership Fund (COF) that enters its final trenche starting 30th May and ending 26th June at 2 pm. This is a significant fund and has £47 million remaining for this final window. It can grant up to £2 million for an application but most are around £250,000! We shall prepare an Expression of Interest and outline application in anticipation of a positive result, enabling the ASK Hive Community Hub to get off to a brilliant start. On of the key advantages to the COF is that the matching funding required is only 20%!

To meet this we shall have to raise, with local assistance from our community, donations from businesses and other grant providers, about £50,000. This will enable us to refurbish and repair the school to our ends and with all the potential community benefits we aim to have a nursery and bakery / shop outlet to contribute to the long term viability and sustainability ensuring that its is not at the whim of requiring ongoing support like many other village halls.

We hope to issue a positive statement as soon as we receive the decision and will be asking for help to get us underway.

We have our fingers crossed.

In touch with Council News

This is the first time I have been asked to write in the Plough and I am delighted to do so.

It will enable you to keep you in touch with what is happening at County Hall.

Once again we have arrived at the end of the Parish Year and I believe summer may be on its way!

The one word I would use to describe this year, is **STORMS**, one after the other resulting in severe flooding, leaving homes ruined and roads damaged and Kelham Bridge repeatedly closed.

I fully understand residents concerns and their fear of flooding. The flooding has left roads in disrepair throughout the county, which will cost hundreds of thousands to repair.

We have to appeal to the new Mayor who will now have the money and roads will be repaired as soon as we have funds available to do them.

NCC as the lead flood authority have written and produced Section 19 relating to Storm Babette, but Section 19 has yet to be written for Storm Henk. Evidence is still being gathered.

Flood wardens found that motorists move cones and road closure signs. Drivers go through the flooded road, causing a wave of water which pours into properties flooding them and causing danger to other motorists. I understand moulded interconnecting plastic barriers may be used in the future, they are not so easy to disconnect.

I, along with a working group have worked with the Property Officer at NCC to enquire if the villages are able to lease the school. I have also held discussions with the Property Cabinet Member emphasising the importance to the residents to have a Community Hub where you are able to hold events .

We should hear their decision if our request has been allowed next month, fingers crossed.

In touch with Council News continued

Earlier this year, the Parish Council Chairman, myself and Phil Musson had a meeting with the owner's representative, Stuart, at Kelham Hall to see if they would allow residents to walk on the outside edge of Kelham Hall grounds.

It appears when they first took over Kelham Hall they allowed everyone from anywhere to walk through the grounds.

Visitors apparently destroyed ornaments in the gardens so, they stopped public access, which is quite understandable.

Stuart said he would speak to the owners, we asked if residents could have a special locked access into the grounds, explaining local residents would not create that kind of damage.

I mentioned the Access group could apply for a Right of Way, Stuart said they had a lot of evidence to prevent that.

We have not heard from Stuart since our meeting which is somewhat disappointing. It appears the Management will not differentiate between local residents and members of the public. In the meantime, despite the new gates and fencing, we were told the general public are still finding access into the hall garden. Should the Access group decide to proceed with a Right of Way through Kelham Hall grounds, I will help you seek the way forward with the Rights of Way department at NCC.

I have a modest budget available this year. As in previous years, I am happy to give a contribution to a project or event and will support your event if invited. When you request funding, payment is delayed if all details aren't given- name, address, name of group, telephone number, email address, bank details. There is strict scrutiny regarding these payments. We will continue to work together to keep the villages as lovely as they are.

Thank you everyone, Parish Councillors, and volunteers who play such a large part in providing and working within the villages.


Taster workshops are available on various dates from April 2024 in my studio at Kelham, near Newark at £25 per person, cost includes all materials required.

ASK Garden Club - Garden Visit

Tithe Barn, Wellow

Fifteen of us were welcomed by Andrew & Carrie Young at the end of a long driveway flanked by topiary yew trees. Apparently, there had been similarly shaped leylandii when they moved there in 2001, but as we all know, leylandii are difficult to keep maintained and have a tendency to die off at the base and not grow back. These were removed and replaced in 2011 with yew; these are more suitable for



trimming and surprisingly have matured well in just thirteen years.

We gathered under the wisteria which was in full flower, and then Andrew led us to a paved patio area where erigeron and primula had naturalised in the

crevices between the paving stones. From this we could see a wonderful open vista of the more formal area of the garden.

An avenue of newly planted golden yew trees drew the eye to a beautiful mature blue cedar tree, which was one of the few existing trees they inherited. As we crossed the well maintained lawns, Andrew pointed out the many examples of their companion planting. Scrambling through apple trees were continued

climbing and rambling roses, clematis and honeysuckle. All extending interest and colour throughout the seasons.

Through a wooden gate a 'secret' woodland garden and walk can be found alongside the Wellow Dyke which featured mature shade loving



shrubs including a very impressive cornus kousa in flower. Sadly because of its location, I was unable to take a photo of this without risk of falling down the bank and into dyke!

Many of the formal borders were filled with

David Austin roses, peonies, and bearded iris, Andrew was lucky enough

to purchase some of the irises from Doddington Hall after the gardeners' had lifted and divided the rhizomes in autumn.

We returned to the patio to enjoy tea, coffee and a variety or delicious cakes made by Carrie for the occasion. It started to spot with rain, but that didn't stop us having a good chat and catch up.... mainly about gardening until the light faded and we had to set off back home.

National Fish and Chip Day

National Fish & Chip Day, now in its ninth year, returns on Thursday, June 6th, 2024, breaking the tradition of holding the event on a Friday in order to honour the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings. The first AKS 'Time for a Cuppa' continued



Dementia is a term used to describe a group of symptoms that affect memory, thinking, and social abilities. It isn't a specific disease itself but rather a collection of symptoms. Here are some key points about dementia:

Symptoms: Dementia symptoms can include memory loss, difficulty with communication, reduced ability to organize or solve problems, confusion, disorientation, changes in personality, and more.

Causes: Several diseases can cause dementia. The most common type is **Alzheimer's disease**, but other causes include damage to brain cells due to aging, family history, blood vessel issues, protein accumulation, genetic disorders, infections, and more.

Diagnosis: Doctors use various tests, including patient history, laboratory examinations, cognitive tests, neurological assessments, CT scans, MRIs, and PET scans, to diagnose dementia.

Treatment: While most types of dementia cannot be cured, treatments aim to reduce symptoms and slow progression. Nottinghamshire is home to some wonderful places, from quaint villages and historic market towns, to the bustling city suburbs and forgotten hamlets. However, depending on where you go and who you speak to across the county, there are some places with names people cannot agree on.

After decades of debate there are many locations that visitors and even some residents still struggle to pronounce, and even Nottinghamshire is often pronounced incorrectly. With the correct pronunciation being Nottingham-shur; rather than Nottingham-shire.

We have picked out some of the places people are most likely to argue about the pronunciation, but we will let you decide how each should be said...

Southwell

Famous for its stunning Minister which is almost 1,000 years old, Southwell is a beloved town in the county close to Newark-on-Trent. However, depending on who you ask, some call it South-well whereas others say Suth-ell. It is understood that residents in the town opt for the first choice, whereas visitors and people from other areas name it Suth-ell.

Rainworth

Another cause for debate is the lovely village of Rainworth near Mansfield. Some people opt for the whereas others do not, so it is either Renn-uth or Rain-worth. Although most people seem to lean towards the Renn-uth pronunciation.

Averham

Also located near Newark is the peaceful village of Averham. It was originally known as Egrum in the Domesday Book, when the village only had 21 villagers, 22 smallholders, 13 freemen and one priest.



Historically the letters and were written in the same way, which is why the is not pronounced in Averham. It is rather Air-ham than Aver-ham.

Belvoir

Although technically on the Nottinghamshire border with Leicestershire, one name everyone seems to get wrong is Belvoir. The name comes from the French word, which means beautiful view, but it is actually pronounced locally as Beaver, not Bel-voir. It is thought that this is because the Anglo-Saxon populace couldn't get their tongues around the tricky pronunciation.

"Headlines Getting Bigger"

The headlines are beginning to get bigger ... leaflets are fluttering onto the mat.

Before long we, and approximately 46,560,452 other people, will be invited to put an X on a piece of paper - either at home or in a polling booth. It is a strange way of running a country and it is called democracy. Churchill put his finger on it, 'Many forms of Government have been tried in this world of sin and woe. No one pretends that democracy is perfect or all-wise. Indeed it has been said that democracy is the worst form of Government except for all those other forms that have been tried.'

What sort of leadership do we want from any new government?

In the Old Testament there is an answer which stands out in one delightful story. Solomon is talking to God. I wonder how many new Prime Ministers (or lots of other recently appointed people) have said, 'I'm here and I don't know what to do'! Solomon went on to pray for 'a discerning heart to govern your people and to distinguish between right and wrong'. Sometimes 'a discerning heart' is translated 'wisdom' but I prefer the first - discernment is about careful judgement, making good decisions, following things through.

To lead this country we need someone who has a moral compass - someone who knows how 'to distinguish between right and wrong' - and, more difficult, between the right and the nearly right. It's difficult to say that that has been very evident recently.

The story ends by God commending Solomon for not asking for personal gain or political victory. Instead he had asked for something which would make him a better leader. In the event Solomon spectacularly failed and ended up with 700 wives. Its not difficult to think of other leaders who have started off with the best of intentions and then have let personal or political issues swamp their good intentions.

We are told to pray for 'those in authority that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness' (1 Timothy 4.1) - which is certainly much better than grumbling at them!
