**Book News for July** 

#### A Song for Dark Times by Ian Rankin: Book Review from Jenny Quickmire

I have just finished reading the latest John Rebus adventure by Ian Rankin *A Song for Dark Times*. Written in Rankin's usual lively style, I felt the plot was a little thin for a John Rebus story. All the usual protagonists were there but the plot seemed a little diluted and focused heavily on the dysfunctional relationship between Rebus and his daughter Samantha. However, it was still very readable and I could recommend it to any Rebus fans. Just a bit different from the normal Rebus. Sadly I can't pass it onto the church book club as it is on my Kindle!

#### *Edward the Elder and the Making of England* by Harriet Harvey Wood: Book Review from Judith Mills

Most of us will know about Alfred the Great and how he burnt the cakes while day-dreaming; and many of us will know that that day-dream led him to unite the Anglo-Saxon Kingdoms of Wessex (where he was King) and Mercia, ruled by a Ealdorman at that time. Together they managed to hold back the invading Viking hoards. Far less well-known is Alfred's son, Edward the Elder who not only consolidated what his father had started but managed, through agreements, alliances, creating great defences and running successful military campaigns managed push back the invaders. He also established the idea of a single kingdom of England. In many ways, his contribution to the foundation of this country as we know it is far more important than his famous father's. This is, to a great extent, due to an historical accident that means that far less documentary evidence has survived for Edward than for Alfred.

This history book—and it is a history book, not a novel—uses what evidence

that has survived to uncover Edward's story in a very non-technical, easy to read and absorbing way.

This area—along the Trent—was an important boundary between the Viking Kingdom of the north and the Anglo-Saxon kingdom of the south. We even have tangible evidence of that at Averham which boasts one of the—if not the—oldest church foundation in the County. If you've ever wanted to find out about the history of our region, then this book is a very good place to start.

If you have a Kindle Unlimited account, it is FREE to read on your Kindle or Kindle eReader. The paperback version costs £8.99.

#### AND A BLAST FROM THE PAST

For those of you who like Agatha Christie, have you come across *They Came to Baghdad*? I found my very yellowed paperback copy (bought 1971, cost 35p, first published 1951) on my bookshelf the other day and decided to revisit it.

It doesn't include either of the usual protagonists (Poirot or Marple) but is set in Iraq at the time when it was under British control. Christie lived there with her archaeologist husband so her descriptions of streets, houses and people are first-hand and very evocative. The book is aged and probably not very 'PC' now but I very much enjoyed the atmosphere and an intriguing story. It's worth going back, sometimes.

Many readers will know Paul and Lorraine Bousfield of Hopwass Close Averham very well, and those that do will have sadness in their hearts because they are moving on to pastures new. We wish them well in their new home and happiness in all they do. For those who perhaps don't know them so well here is a little potted history of their time lived in Averham:

In 2006 Paul called a meeting at Manners Sutton School. He was acting as AKS Parish Plan Co-ordinator and the meeting was to identify local needs and



issues in the community of our village's. More than 60 people attended the meeting and out of this was born several community groups which included: **A.S.K About** 

Residents had indicated that they would like more community activities and gatherings so ASK About was formed to help keep the community spirit alive. Paul and Lorraine have certainly achieved this and were at the helm of the group. Along with other volunteers they were the main organisers of lots of village events, the first of which was a *Music and Mingle* evening held at The Robin Hood Theatre in 2006. It was a very successful event and was followed by Cream tea, Skittle evenings, quizzes and supper nights, huge village summer fetes, afternoon crafting sessions and many more.

One of their main events has been Christmas Carols sung in the grounds of Manners Sutton School since 2008 every Christmas Eve. Lorraine and Paul provided mince pies and mulled wine to over 70 villagers and it has been one of the most popular and well supported events every year since then. All of this was would not have happened without Paul and Lorraine!

We will miss their caring, pro-active and fun loving personalities and want to thank them deeply for all they have done for our community over the years, not just as ASK About event organisers but as friends and villagers whom Averham, Staythorpe and Kelham will never forget.

ASK About will live on but it really is going to be a hard act to follow with a little chunk of its heart missing!

If you have not had the honour of knowing Paul and Lorraine or attending one of their events, well just "ASK About" and you are sure to find someone who will have great memories of their events.

### WI News for July 2021

We have continued to meet via Zoom and this month's speaker, Penny Latham from the NatWest Bank, shared some very useful tips on how to avoid on-line fraud and scams. Penny, who lives and works in Gloucestershire, is the community liaison officer for the bank in her area, shared some of her personal experiences. She stressed that anyone can be affected not just through on-line activity. Lots of us have had 'funny 'phone calls asking to contact HMRC or asking for payment for a missed delivery etc. Her advice is *think* before you press any link tabs and avoid giving any personal information, even to survey sites, as this can be accessed by hard core criminals who are very smart and devious. Another golden rule to avoid scams by phone is not to answer if you don't recognise the number. If the call is important the caller will use other ways to make contact. i.e. by letter, email or text. But be aware and do not click links on unfamiliar texts purporting to come, say, from your bank; no bank will try to contact you in this way. Never give your bank details in any form to anyone unless you can verify the contact. It all felt like a minefield, but Penny posted a useful list of help sites which is on the village WhatsApp for your info. On a lighter note, we managed to walk 135.2 'WI miles 'during May as part of

the WI Notts County Fed initiative to get us out and about again. A small group of us have really enjoyed our Wednesday trot along the towpaths and have decided to continue with a local monthly walk. If anyone would like to join in just post it on the village WhatsApp and I can forward the details.

July will see us actually having a live get together by the Fishermen's Hut on July 13th starting at 1pm. We are bringing our own picnic lunch and will be enjoying each other's company and a quiz. Just hope the weather doesn't let us down!!

### Rev'd Georgie's Message to all in Averham, Kelham and Staythorpe

I am writing this article very early because I will be away on the deadline day. The weather is glorious so summer clothes out at last. The garden is growing slowly and it has to be said, it's a bit patchy.

It set me thinking about growth. I remember aunts and uncles when I was younger, seeing me and saying "my haven't you grown!". Well I was a child what else would happen! I wouldn't like to hear that as an adult.

Growth describes things that are getting bigger. There are at least 80 synonyms describing growth. The opposite of growth is shrinking or failing to thrive.

Parts of my garden has failed to thrive and other areas are growing well.

Our church yards have been growing. We have joined the Count on Nature initiative and have looked into what's in our Gods Acre.



There are many wild flowers, insects, bugs and beetles in the churchyards. Each has an individual look. We are working towards rewilding areas of the different churchyards and how we can use these wonderful spaces. Seeking to grow the churches both outside and inside. Churches have an individual feel or atmosphere. You have probably sensed that in your local

churches as well as those you have probably visited when on holiday. We are

looking to sow the seeds of growth for our churches. We would love to hear from you about ideas you have, or have gathered from other churches to enable growth. During this pandemic we have heard lots about keeping this local, this can apply to our faith and churches too.

Many things have been happening lately that have made me wonder about my personal growth. As an adult it is very easy to stop growing and developing. It probably takes more effort because we are further away from education, but there are many useful things on the internet. Locally there are different groups we can join.

The church has a group called Emmaus . We are all on our own journeys just as the disciples were as they walked on the road to Emmaus and Jesus joined them. We are at the moment meeting via Zoom as we seek to grow together in our faith.
