


## In Memory of Private George W Smith, one of our fallen in World War 1

The annual Service of Remembrance was held at St Michaels church in Averham. As Is tradition, to show respect, the names of the fallen from our villages and the Society of the Sacred Mission were read out.

George was born in Averham to George and Elizabeth Smith in 1890, he had a brother, Edward, and two sisters, Ethel and Mabel. Mabel was Iris's mother.

George attended St Michael's choir in 1899 and was chorister for eight years.

When 18 he joined the Sherwood Foresters and first quartered in Ireland before joining the British Expeditionary Force on 5th November 1914.

## Southwell Music Festival returns this Christmas

Southwell Music Festival is back this December for not one but two festive musical offerings at Southwell Minster.

A Christmas Celebration on Monday 18 December, sees the Southwell Festival Voices join forces with director Marcus Farnsworth and narrator Simone Ibbett-Brown to share carols old and new in a stunning and atmospheric sequence of poetry and music celebrating the joy of Christmas.



Audiences are promised an evening of intimate music and words reflecting the themes of hope and peace central to the Christmas story. The festive programme features classic carols and seasonal works from composers, including Errollyn Wallen, Jonathan Dove and Cecilia McDowell, alongside the poetry of Carol Ann Duffy, Maya Angelou, Thomas Hardy, and Emily Dickinson.

This year the Festival team will also host its first ever **Festive Family Carols** on Sunday 17 December. This relaxed, interactive, daytime concert features a 50-minute programme of popular carols and music performed by a quartet of Festival Voices. Host Marcus Farnsworth will be leading proceedings, including the opportunity to join together and sing along to a few much-loved Christmas songs.

Christmas jumpers and festive wear are very much encouraged, with prizes for the best dressed.

Festival Director Marcus Farnsworth said: "Following a brilliant 2023 Festival, we are delighted to extend our Southwell Christmas offering. We look forward to welcoming the local community and music-lovers to one, or maybe even both events to share some seasonal joy".

The Festival is led by former Southwell Minster Head Chorister, now award-winning international baritone Marcus Farnsworth. As well as leading the Festival, Marcus is also Head of Vocal and Choral Studies at Chetham's School of Music and Music Director of Southwell Choral Society.

## **Parish Council Meeting Report**

At the November meeting the location of future meetings was discussed. It was agreed that while the offer of a free meeting room was available at Kelham Hall, meetings would continue to be held there.

The Parish Council have a very small precept and they have a duty to spend it in a prudent manner.

A number of residents were present who wanted to discuss access to Kelham Hall grounds. Following the recent meeting with Stuart Downham from Kelham Hall, a small resident's group will form with the aim of continuing the dialog with the Hall. A report of the meeting is available on the Parish Council website with the November Meeting Agenda

The Planning Application for the solar farm and BESS on land in Kelham was also discussed, it was agreed to object to the application.

The Parish Council are in contact with other parishes in the area who are affected by the GNR Solar Farm proposal and will work together to gather information and respond to the scoping consultation on the Environmental Impact Assessment sent out by the Planning Inspectorate.

The commemorative tree outside Staythorpe Power Station has died, this will be replaced in the very near future and the plaque installed at the same time. The 3 commemorative planters will also be replanted with winter flowering plants and spring bulbs and the plaques installed at the same time.

The next meeting is Monday 15<sup>th</sup> January at 7:00pm at Kelham Hall; deadline for items to be included on the agenda is 5pm on the Tuesday before, 9<sup>th</sup> January.

## The Book Club

The first book for the village book club had a rather negative review. 'The Figurine' by Victoria Hislop, is set largely in Greece during the political period of unrest and dictatorship or the 1960s and 70s. \It tells the story of Helena: a lady of mixed birth having a Scottish father and a Greek mother.

Helena is sent to stay with her Greek very wealthy and influential grandparents during school holidays. The family troubles begin to be realized by Helena over several summer vacations. Her grandfather is a grandiose of the far right regime. He is a brutal and vengeful man and Helena takes an immediate dislike to



him, but loves her grandma. The story follows Helena through coping with the estrangement of her mother with her grandfather and was the cause of her mother leaving home and moving to England. The story gradually evolves through a doomed love story, (she picked a real no good'n) to her finding a love of archaeology and finally making her life in Athens.

The general consensus was that the style of writing is rather basic and somewhat naïve. We agreed that it took a good 50% of the book to get any real meat on the story bones so to speak but when it it did it was a page turner. Not a book for my Christmas list, but that's not a problem as we have two books to read before our next meeting on January 11<sup>th</sup> A seasonally topical 'The Christmas Guest' by Peter Swanson and The Silent Patient by Alex Michaelides. Hope I get time to read them as I am wading through 950 pages of the latest Cormoran Strike!

## MAY I WISH YOU A VERY BLESSED CHRISTMAS

Yes, I realise that in the Church we have Advent first (the time of preparation for the great Festival). But may it be CHRISTmas that we celebrate, not Xmas. Even though originally that X was short for "Christ", today it stands more for something unknown or anonymous. So, I invite you to make something of the CHRIST aspect of the Festival (even if you may not be a profound believer), because much that is good and that we take for granted in our society stems from Christian, or certainly Biblical, origins. This reflects the primacy of the Christian Faith in our nation's history. Yes, there have been failings, disputes, divisions, etc. over the centuries, all very regrettable but sadly very human. But the Christian ethic is based on belief in the God of the Bible and Jesus Christ's understanding of this, with its emphasis on "God loves YOU, and if you know that, you will want to "love God and your neighbour as yourself". This is at the root of our society, its development, its laws, its improvement over the generations - to be lost at our peril.

We are developing into a "secular society", with declining religious belief and affiliation, and this will bring its own problems; society will be much affected, because we human beings are naturally self-centred, and a Christian faith helps to counter that. The Ten Commandments (are children taught about them these days?) still represent the best way of conducting human living, with the emphasis on fair treatment for all and the sharing of good things for others' benefit. Yes, we have not got it all right by any means, either in the church, in society, or in government, but at root this has a sound basis. Central to this is the life and the ministry of Jesus Christ - and we mark the start of this with Christmas. So do celebrate CHRISTmas - it would be lovely to see you at a Christmas Service in one of our Churches (details are included in this Magazine).

But above all celebrate CHRIST in your heart, your family and in your life and work generally. We can all benefit from focusing on this, and so can those around us. It can make a real difference.


