them. Bats make up to 25% of mammal species in the UK, with 18 species having been identified, and 17 of those breed in the UK. Bats do an excellent job of keeping down the insect population, so we should all try to support them and provide habitat, like mature trees and ponds.

# **ASK Gardening and Social Club**

On 26<sup>th</sup> September – just too late to make October's Plough – eighteen Gardening Club members and four guests met at Southwell Garden Centre for the Annual Dahlia, Bean and Potatoes competition.

For those who don't know the rules, earlier in the year members chose a seed potato from a single batch and, if needed, a bucket to grow the potatoes in, three bean seeds also from a single batch, and a dahlia tuber. Prizes are awarded for the heaviest weight of potatoes in the bucket, the longest bean and the prettiest dahlia.



There were 20 entries for the potato in a bucket competition and the weigh-in was overseen by Nigel Britton and John Clegg. The winner was Ann Speir with a crop weighing 4lbs 3oz, slightly less than her winning entry last year which came in at 4lbs 10oz – she retains possession of the lan Justice trophy for the heaviest crop of potatoes. Judith Mills (me!) came a close second with 3lbs 14oz and Janina

Sulek was third with 2lbs 11oz.

The Maureen Justice Trophy for the longest bean at 37cm was won by Heather Wolfenden. As Heather was on holiday Janina received the trophy on her behalf but also claimed some of the credit as she had picked the bean on Heather's behalf.

The final prize – the Maureen Lawrence trophy for the prettiest dahlia – was won by Barbara Armstrong.



After the measuring and weighing, everyone tucked into a lovely buffet, and there was also the opportunity to buy winter bedding and other gardening items at a discounted price.

Thanks have to go to Nigel for organising the venue and the weigh-in, and to everyone who took part in this fun, friendly but hard-fought competition.

The AGM was held on 24<sup>th</sup> October, and this will be reported in the next edition of the Plough. The November meeting is on 23<sup>rd</sup> November (**note**: this is a Thursday), when Neil Timms from the Fern Nursery at Binbrook Lincolnshire will talk about his experiences exhibiting at Flower Shows. ## **Southwell Ploughing Match & Show**

This year the annual Southwell Ploughing Match & Show came to our area on the 30<sup>th</sup> September, being jointly hosted by the Miller and Staniforth farms.

The two families have been neighbours since the Staniforths moved to Grange Farm, South Muskham in 1942. The Millers moved to Manor Farm, Kelham in 1939.

The Society was formed in 1855 and was known as the Upton Farming & Gardening Society. The first event took place on Mr Esam's farm at Averham Park in 1856.

The show has developed into a big attraction covering about 200 acres for the show field, ploughing fields and car parking. Free draining soils are a prerequisite for being hosts which was imperative this year as our inclement weather tried its best to disrupt things.



The occasion brings the local farming and wider rural community together to celebrate agriculture past and present. From the teams of horses ploughing with a single furrow which would usually cover 1-1.5 acres/day. As the industrial revolution influenced agriculture, we have the wonderful traction engines that pulled a 4 furrow plough up and down the field and a team of three men could cover 20 acres/day. These two traction engines on show started their working life in

East Leake in 1874 and finished in 1950 at T Hammond & Sons of Redhill, Nottingham.



Tractors really took off after the Second World War with many examples of vintage tractors working in the ploughing fields up to the modern monster machines guided by satellites that we see today.







Of course, the show is more than just ploughing with sheep and cattle classes. The Produce tent displays an array of classes from grain, roots exhibits and from the kitchen jams and cakes.

The Horse section and Dog Show have recently become very popular as the show expands it range of events. The Main Ring attraction of Paul Hannan Stunt Show

wooed show goers as he leapt over a collection of 4x4 vehicles.

A thoroughly good day was had by all; a big thank you to the large team of volunteers who put an unbelievable amount of work into organising the Show. Roll on to 2024 when the show moves to the Oxton Estate on 28th September.

## **Our Village Churches**

Averham and Kelham with North and South Muskham are part of a a group—or Benefice– known as the Riverside Parishes which is appropriate as all four are next to the Trent.

For the last few years, we have shared our 'Priest in Charge' with six churches in the Beck and Trent Benefice which comprises Caunton, Cromwell, Norwell, Ossington, Sutton on Trent and Carlton on Trent. Rev. Georgie—who we always called our 'vicar' was officially Associate Priest for Riverside.

Sadly we have not had a Priest in Charge for a little while and of course Rev. Georgie has just retired so both benefices are without a priest. The churchwardens and the Parochial Church Councils of both Riverside and Beck and Trent are working closely to not only recruit a new vicar for us but also to assist each other in as many ways as possible.

We are being supported in this by Rev. James Halstead who was recently appointed as Area Dean and he has written this month's church message.

We are also publishing the services dates and times for the Beck and Trent churches and hope to find other ways of helping each other.

# What family do you belong to? James Halstead, Area Dean


On the face of it, that's such a simple question – but in a world where so many move house, job or community so often (however enthusiastically or reluctantly), where we find 'home' or 'family' is an increasingly complicated thing to ask. Strangely, November is a special month in which to ponder these things.

Of course, many will gather in our villages and churches for Remembrance again this year. The opportunity to remind ourselves of women and men, some perhaps known to us personally, others from our wider communities, who gave their lives for our ongoing peace – or who continue to offer themselves for service, both at home and abroad.

But in the Church's calendar, the season of remembering begins slightly earlier than this. In fact, All Saints Day (1<sup>st</sup> November) is a wonderful opportunity to remind ourselves of all those – throughout time, across the world – in whose lives the Church has seen the grace of God powerfully at work. Sometimes that has been in extraordinary circumstances, sometimes in the very ordinary of everyday. Perhaps you have known such 'saints' in your own experience. And many of our churches may be marking special 'Memorial Services' as opportunities for us to remember those who have especially borne something of God's kindness to us in our lives in the past.

But put together, all these 'rememberings' remind us of a truth the Christian tradition has long taught us: that, through faith in Jesus Christ, we become members of a company of believers – a 'family,' we might call it – who belong to one another, even through death.

Of course, remembering can bring us sadness. But it can also offer hope, as we think on those who've given themselves to the Lord's work in life, or for our freedom in death. It can remind us there is much beyond the world we can merely see, a life beyond death. And this, I think, points us beyond this month of remembrance: because what we celebrate *next* month – the coming of God into this world he made – is the true reminder of the hope we're offered. Forgiveness for past wrongs, hope for a better future, and (in the meantime) a welcome into the greatest family of all. The Bible tells us that Christian people are 'adopted' as God's own children – and that's where we find our true home.


December it is hoped to have a group effort to trim the church for Christmas along with a mince pie as a reward. Date to be arranged.


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
